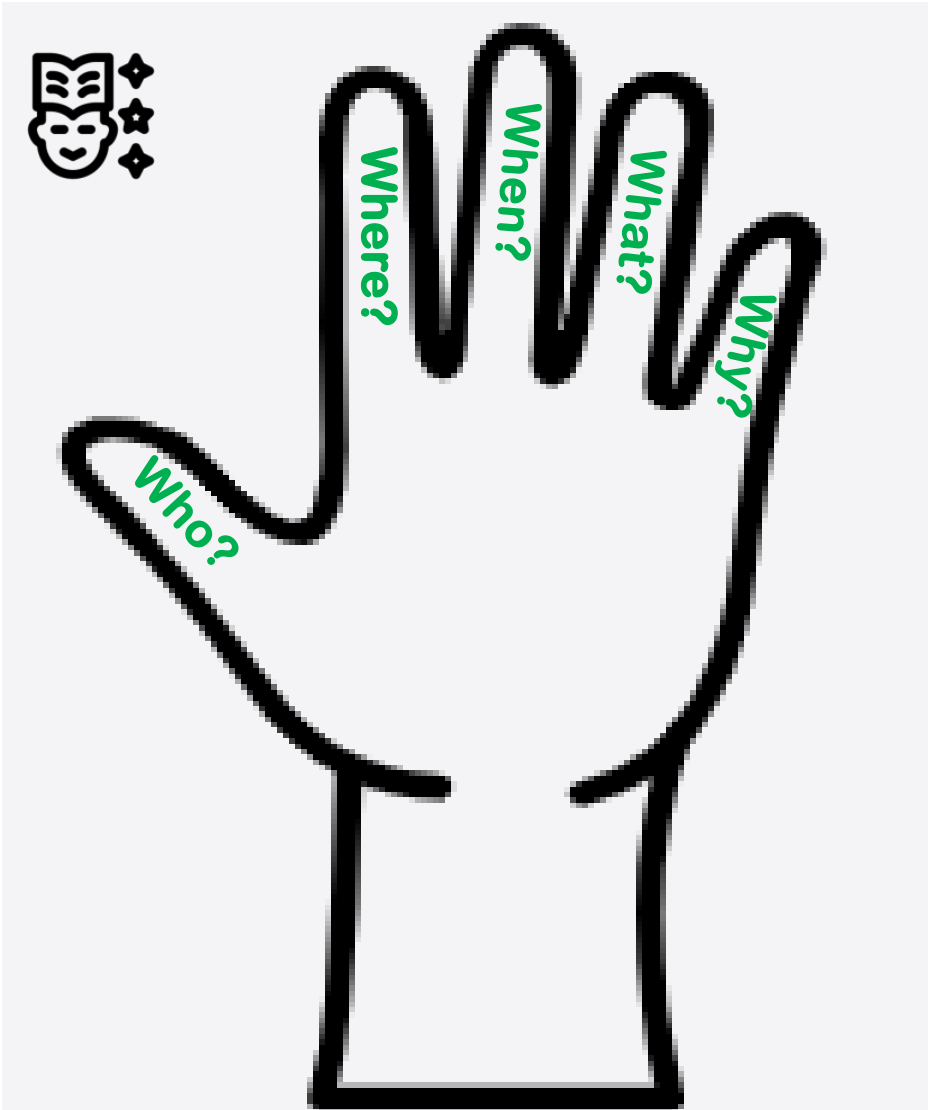
1. She gave a genuine laugh as she walked away with tears rolling down her cheeks – she had never felt so miserable.

3. “I am genuinely worried about them – it’s dark, wet and stormy out there!” wailed the mum.



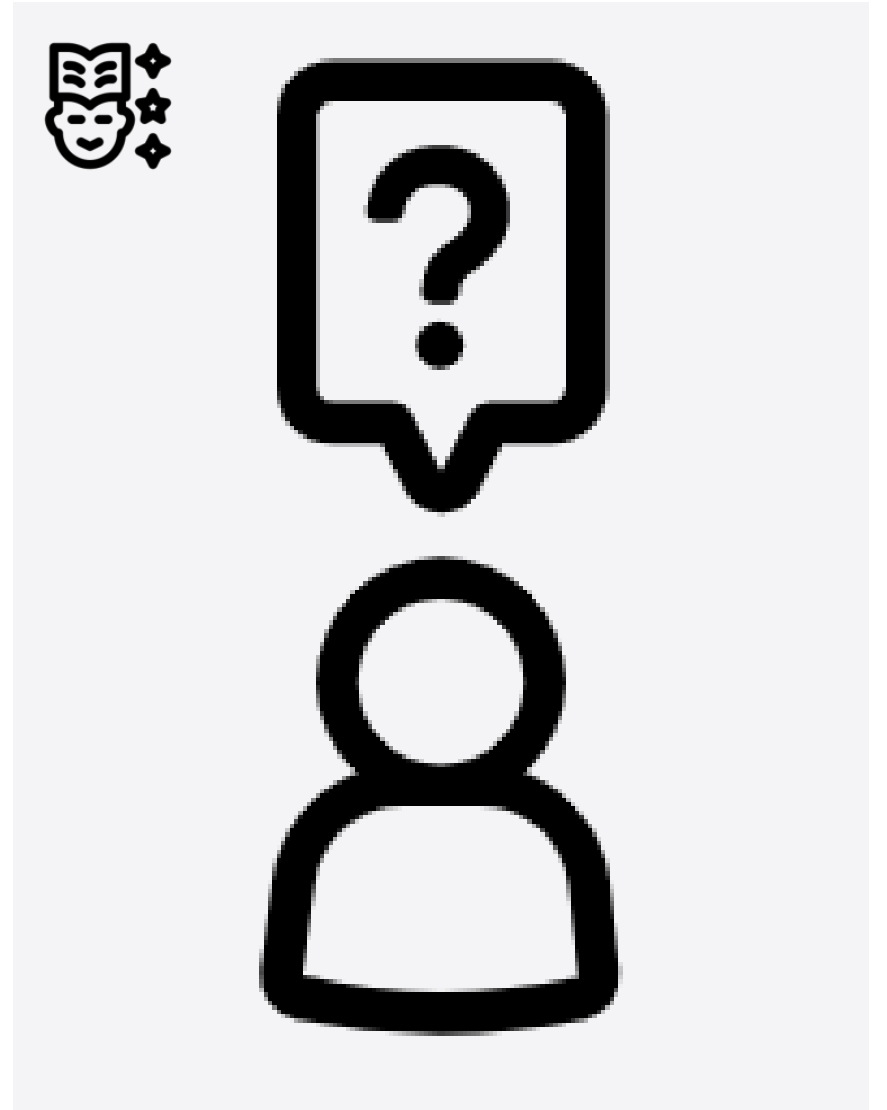

How to clarify...

- **Make** connections with the title or blurb before you read the text.
- **Read** the whole sentence if you are unsure what a word means.
- **Use** other words you DO know to help you understand new words.
- **Reread** a sentence if it does not make sense.
